




What are memes?

- ▶ Richard Dawkins defined memes as 'small cultural units of transmission, analogous to genes, that spread from person to person by copying or imitation. Examples of memes in his pioneering essay include cultural artifacts such as melodies, catchphrases, and clothing fashions, as well as abstract beliefs (for instance, the concept of God) (Dawkins, 1976).
- Dawkins' meme was the cultural equivalent of the gene.
- Memes are a group of digital items sharing common characteristics of content, form, and/or stance, which were created with awareness of each other, and were circulated, imitated, and/or transformed via the Internet by many users. (Shifman 2019)





- shared memory of cultural icons and archetypes
- take their source from movies, songs, fashion trends, viral challenges and childhood nostalgia

Why consider memes for the classroom?

- classroom motivation (Harshavardhan et al, 2019)
- classroom participation through instagramming (Purnama et al, 2018)
- increase visual literacy (Romero and Bobkina, 2017)
- inducing writing skills (Huang, 2017)
